Welcome to the Brisbane Youth Service quarterly newsletter for supporters and friends

A word with the CEO

It has been another busy and productive year at <u>Brisbane Youth Service</u>. We have assisted more than 1400 young people and young families (including144 children) and provided casual support, advice and information to an additional 1325 young people, family and community members. Just over half of the young people were homeless at the time we met them and 80 per cent described their living situations as unsafe, unsuitable, temporary or unaffordable. Concerningly, the number of young people who seek help from BYS continues to grow each year with a seven per cent increase last year and a 13 per cent increase over the past three years. As you can imagine this places a strain on our finite resources and is challenging for staff who work tirelessly to find safe housing and support young people to move out of crisis. Our focus on continuous improvement means we are always looking for ways to respond to gaps in services and emerging needs. This year we established two new temporary positions; a Safe Relationships Project Officer and a Safe and Connected Family Worker. We also launched our new Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) and the trial of a Couch Surfing Hotline which you will read about in this newsletter.

With Christmas just around the corner, it is important to remember it can be a difficult time for young people who are isolated and disconnected from family and support networks. You can help us spread some Christmas cheer this year with our upcoming Christmas Appeal. By purchasing a hamper or giving a donation you'll be assisting vulnerable young people caught in crisis and making Christmas a bit brighter for them and their children. COUCH SURFING HOTLINE

This month, BYS excitedly launched its new <u>Couch Surfing Hotline</u>, an 18 month pilot project funded by the Queensland Mental Health Commission. Couch surfing is the most common way young people experience homelessness and is a widespread, national issue. Half of the young people who seek help from BYS are couch surfing and young women and LGBTIQ+ young people are over represented in the couch surfing population. BYS's new Couch Surfing Hotline provides support for young couch surfers, concerned family members and carers, and people providing temporary or 'couch' accommodation to young people. THAT'S A WRAP! DAGGY JUMPER DAY & BRIDGE TO BRISBANE

Our sixth annual Daggy Jumper Day campaign was held in August to raise funds and awareness for young people experiencing homelessness in our community. A huge thank you to all organisations and supporters who helped to create new futures for young people by getting involved in this year's campaign. The help of local community groups and our valued corporate partners helped raise more than \$9,500 for young people.

August was a huge month for BYS with the organisation also taking part in <u>The Sunday Mail Bridge to Brisbane</u> as a VIP charity for the first time and raising more than \$7000. BYS was thrilled to welcome major corporate partner, Student One, to *Team End Youth Homelessness* as a VIP runner, as well as BYS corporate partners and sponsors, Rochele Painting, KPMG, Jacobs Brisbane and Commonwealth Bank Eagle Street. We were delighted to be a VIP Charity Partner of Bridge to Brisbane in 2019 and we're grateful to our partners and supporters who

are helping us to address the growing problem of youth homelessness.


RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN

In September, BYS hosted some special guests at the Fortitude Valley Hub with BYS Patron, Steve Renouf, and Aboriginal elder, Aunty Dawn Daylight, joining BYS to launch our new Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). Steve shared a powerful story about his experience moving from his small town of Murgon to Brisbane where he was shocked to discover there were young people experiencing homelessness - some of them were people he knew. Over 31 per cent of young people who sought BYS support in 2018-19 identified as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. It is essential we continue to grow our knowledge of the culture and history of the First Australians as we strive to offer service responses based on respect and understanding.

BYS Valley Hub receives fresh new look



A couch is not a home: New BYS hotline tackles hidden homelessness



BYS is tackling a hidden form of homelessness with the launch of a new <u>Couch Surfing Hotline</u>. The launch comes after research undertaken in 2018 by BYS in partnership with Griffith Criminology Institute attracted national media attention and revealed young **couch surfers** have consistently higher rates of poor mental health than any other group of young people seeking support from BYS, even those who are sleeping rough.
